Our mission

Gift of Life was established in the UK in 2011 as a sister charity to Podari Zhizn, a leading Russian children's cancer charity founded by actresses Chulpan Khamatova and Dina Korzun.

Our mission is to ensure children and young adults with cancer and haematological disease in Russia can receive the most effective and modern medical care, and non-medical support.



Our programmes

We support international programmes of Podari Zhizn, including:



'Life-saving' medications unavailable in Russia in 2020

As always, foreign medications remain our major expense. The purchase of vital drugs, often unavailable in Russia, continued throughout 2020. Thanks to Gift of Life's help, 32 children directly received life-saving treatments.

The drugs include Defitelio, Foscavir, Sidofovir and Probenecid. Doctors call them 'emergencies', as these medications are often urgently needed to deal with dangerous complications after bone marrow transplantation.

So, in 2020, Gift of Life purchased Foscavir twice for tenyear-old Kira Spis, who was born with a serious violation of the immune system. Kira underwent two bone marrow transplants, and by autumn she felt well enough to go home. For the first time in her ten years of life, Kira has the chance for a full recovery!





Kira Spis 10 years old This year, Letermovir was added to the 'emergency' medicines. Our donors helped to purchase it for two patients, sixteen-year-old Ilya L. and three-year-old Mikhail Kh.

In addition, thanks to your support, the foundation was able to pay for antifungal drugs to fight serious fungal infections: Noxafil (some patients need a special form of this drug, not available in Russia) and a completely new drug, Kresemba, which was recently registered but has yet come to the Russian market.

The children also received therapy for the most common diseases. As before, in 2020, through the help of our donors we purchased Oncaspar, needed to treat children with leukaemia. State provision of this drug to Russian patients was achieved only at the end of summer, and

even then not in full. Your support has helped secure Oncaspar for seven-yearold Archipp Arsenov, undergoing treatment in Ryazan. Now Archipp has completed the hospital stage of treatment, he was discharged for maintenance therapy, and this autumn he has started school! Due to the risk of COVID infection, Archipp is being home schooled, but this has been a leap forward unimaginable earlier this year.

Among other anticancer drugs purchased this year there were Xaluprine, Eto-Gray and Ixoten. Eighteen-year-old Yegor Korkishko, who received the latter medicine recently completed his treatment and is thriving.

With the help of our donors we were able to pay for few courses of Qarziba for seven-year-old Valery Patashuri from the Moscow region. It is a highly effective immune therapy to fight a dangerous tumour – neuroblastoma. Also this year, Gift of Life began buying a new drug – radioactive iodine MIBG, which is also used to treat neuroblastoma. The first purchase was made in the spring, and the drug prescribed to three-year-old Grigory Krost.

One of the most important purchases of this year was the anticancer drug Tepadina. This medicine is actively used in bone marrow transplants. Unfortunately, it's not in continuous supply in Russia and for many patients the only chance to receive this medication is to buy it abroad. Gift of Life secured the drug for fifteen-vear-old Sasha Zazhigin, who is battling a mixed germ cell tumour.

In total, our expenditure on medicines not currently registered or available in Russia reached £468,388 in 2020.





Surgeries performed by international specialists in 2020

In March, a German surgeon, Professor Ingo Melcher flew to Moscow to perform complex surgery on one of our patients, sixteen-year-old Olga Levi. Olga had a sarcoma and required simultaneous removal of the tumour and complex bone reconstruction. She's continuing therapy at the Dmitry Rogachev Centre in Moscow. Olga's surgery cost £5,333, and was a success; there are no further signs of tumour growth.

Her mother Marina is grateful to everyone who supported Olga:

"The operation went without complications, on the tenth day Olga already could walk. Of course, there's still rehabilitation ahead, but everything is going as planned. The fact that she stands on her feet is truly amazing and I'm so grateful for it. The doctor arrived in March, even though the borders had already begun to close due to quarantine. We managed to have an operation, and literally the next day everything was shut. Huge thanks to all the donors, we couldn't have done it without you!"

Search for bone marrow donors and graft harvesting in 2020

Earlier this year, the foundation paid for several bone marrow transplants from donors unrelated to the children. Donors provide their cells free of charge, but the costs associated with finding a suitable donor in foreign registries, collecting cells, and transporting them to Russia are significant.

Thanks to your generous support, Gift of Life has helped three children with such transplants. Savely Elistratov had a very severe case of leukaemia (and the boy's parents could not become donors for him for medical reasons), Kira Voronina and Nastya Veselova have genetic diseases that require bone marrow transplantation from an unrelated donor. Nastya needed transplantation for Fanconi's anaemia, a serious disease of the haematopoietic system. A suitable donor was found in the USA. In February 2020 her transplant took place, everything went well, and in May Nastya was discharged home.

Educational programme for Russian doctors in 2020

The pandemic left a significant impact on this programme, with some of the major scientific congresses and conferences cancelled or postponed to the next year. However we didn't give in to the circumstances and still managed to provide lots of support to doctors online!

The 46th annual meeting of the European Society for Blood and Marrow Transplantation (EBMT) which was due to take place in Madrid in spring took place online in August.

Registration cost up to £180 and eight doctors from Moscow, Yekaterinburg and Krasnoyarsk took part in it, which allowed them to widen their knowledge of cellular and stem cell-based therapies and complications of bone marrow transplantations to save and improve the lives of patients with blood-related disorders.

In addition, eight resuscitation experts from the Dmitry Rogachev Centre presented at the online congress of the European Society of Intensive Care.

The total cost of this programme in 2020 was £5,040. The meetings and conferences postponed to 2021 have been paid and are due to be confirmed.



Our plans within the new reality

In 2021, Gift of Life will continue helping children and young adults with haematological and oncological diseases, focusing on creating a medicine fund for our patients. This invaluable monetary reserve allows us to react quickly as the need arises to purchase 'emergency' drugs. After all, children don't get sick on schedule, treatments are highly individual and every moment counts.

At present **Podari Zhizn needs £3 million a year** to fund 'life-saving' medicines currently unavailable in Russia. Gift of Life already contributes a significant portion of this cost, providing around **£800,000 for medicine** annually.

Only with the regular support of our donors is there a chance for us to pay for these vital treatments, and for the children we help to return to a healthy, fulfilling life.

Pays for sixty vials of Defitelio, a drug which supports liver function after a bone marrow transplant




Pays for a surgery required as a part of Ewing's sarcoma treatment and performed by a specialist surgeon from Germany

How we raise funds

Gift of Life raises funds through regular events, direct appeals and volunteer fundraising.

The major income of the charity is gained via our signature fundraiser – the Old Russian New Year's Eve Gala, which takes place in London on 13 January each year.

In 2020 the gala accounted for over 60% of our annual income with over £720,000 raised during the evening.

All production costs of this charity event are covered by our generous corporate partners, which means all the funds raised during the evening go directly towards our programmes for children with cancer.

Our volunteer initiatives allow us to connect with a wide range of Russian-speaking audience based around Europe.

In 2020 over 300 people supported Gift of Life's volunteer fundraising campaigns. Together with volunteer fundraisers and smaller charity events we've been able to collect almost £30,000.

Donors not just from the UK, but also Switzerland, Germany, France, Spain, Portugal and Finland joined Gift of Life campaigns and events to help children with cancer in Russian hospitals.

Over £217,000 was raised via direct appeals and general donations.


